DEPARTMENT OF ADULT PROBATION

The Department is dedicated to enhancing public safety through supervision standards that implement the practice of judicial accountability, seeking to restore offenders to productive law-abiding citizens. Multiple community collaborations are utilized to offer diverse evidence-based programming designed to encompass positive behavioral change and stability. These coordinated rehabilitative and educational opportunities assist in reducing the recidivism rates of municipal offenders. We believe in an overall rehabilitative supervision model that enhances offender stability through supportive and incentivized encounters while ultimately enforcing the orders of the Court, specifically conditions that support and assist victims of offenders sentenced by Mount Vernon Municipal Court.

The Department experienced a mid-year staff change with the hiring of two probation officers who replaced outgoing personnel. We remained a busy interactive link for community programming and Court-ordered services. There were 7,334 registered visits to the Department. Probation officers conducted a total of 39 Presentence Investigations and completed over 300 supervision intakes. Additional tasks included multiple house checks, jail visits and participation in multi-law enforcement interdictions with the Knox County Sheriff's Office and the Mount Vernon Police Department.

For the fifth consecutive year, the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OHMAS) grant was secured for the MERIT Specialized Docket program. Additionally, OHMAS grant funding for the Mental Health Court Docket was also awarded for FY-25-26. Funding allowed for continued expansion of creative service delivery with our community partners, which included access to services prior to pending conviction and release from incarceration.

PROGRAMS

Anger Management

The anger management program is a closed 12-week course that enhances simple conflict resolution skills by identifying core behavior concepts through practice, review, and a homework assignment process. Services are facilitated by Paul Hart Ruthenbeck, LCDC III with Knox Public Health. There were twenty participants and sixteen graduates.

Relapse Prevention

Relapse prevention is an open course that aids in coping with long-term recovery and relapse avoidance stressors. Participants learn relapse is not a random event, signs can be identified and support applied. The program is a weekly event co-facilitated by Knox Public Health and a probation officer. There were 26 participants that accounted for 300+ combined hours of instructional recovery support, which is equivalent to 14 hours per individual.

Supervised Community Service

Community service work was recorded with several non-profits, including the Byron Saunders Foundation, Adopt a Highway, the City of Mount Vernon (Shred Day, Tire Day, Homeless Site Clean-ups, and Parks Dept.), Mound View Cemetery, Knox County Fair, Mount Vernon Nazarene University, Food for the Hungry, Knox Horse Park and the Ariel Foundation Park. Since 2016, 23 non-profit organizations have been served by the program.

Indigent offenders may perform community service to work off fines and costs. Approximately \$12,220 was credited to fines and costs. Community service hours were also imposed as internal sanctions in lieu of costly jail terms for low-level probation violations. There were approximately 287 community service sanction hours recorded for the year.

Thinking for a Change

A Probation Officer and a Behavioral Healthcare Partners ("BHP") counselor cofacilitate the Thinking for a Change ("T4C") classes. The 16-week course addresses criminal thinking errors in moderate and high-risk offenders. The T4C course graduated five of the seven referred offenders.

Moral Reconation Therapy

Moral Reconation Therapy (MRT) seeks to decrease recidivism by increasing moral reasoning. There were eleven referrals with five offenders completing the program. Four were discharged unsuccessfully, one became employed full-time, and one was removed due to ongoing cognitive concerns.

Trauma Group

Trauma Group is an evidence-based program that teaches offenders how to recover from traumatic events by improving their coping skills and setting realistic life goals. The program is widely used as a therapeutic process and supervision tool to break the cycle of self-destructive offender behavior. There were 10 male and 12 female referrals. The men's program had nine graduates, and the women's program recorded six graduates.

Hands Down Domestic Violence Awareness Series

Hands Down is a twelve-hour, four-week class series for offenders who have committed offenses of violence, primarily cases of domestic violence. The program is instructed by Tyler Hitzfield of Central Ohio Assessment. The course had a third consecutive year of 60 participants or more.

Automated Random Drug Testing Program

The Indiko Plus Analyzer and Paracelsus software system is used to allow for incentive or sanction-based adjustments to dosages of supervision and to guide treatment referrals' needs based on sobriety outcomes. Testing was provided for City

Law Director's pretrial supervision cases and courtesy supervision for other Court jurisdictions that included results for approximately 1,675 separate drug assays.

Local drug use trends among offenders are also identified through data collection capabilities. The top three active drugs of abuse were Marijuana, Amphetamines, and ETG (alcohol) detection. Testing also showed a significant increase in Buprenorphine, a Medical Assisted Treatment (MAT) medication. Buprenorphine is used to support recovery from opiate addiction. Of the 21,947 individual drug assay results, approximately 33% were positive for MAT Suboxone treatment. Positive opiate results accounted for less than 1% of the total accumulative test results.

GPS and Continuous Alcohol Monitoring (SCRAM)

Offenders who are prohibited from having contact with crime victims or from consuming alcohol are fitted accordingly with GPS or SCRAM/ CAM (continuous alcohol monitor) devices. The devices are used as a graduated response to specific probation infractions and pretrial bond conditions.

Electronic monitoring at \$14.50 per day is a cost saving compared to the daily incarceration rates of approximately \$85.00 per day to house an inmate in the Knox County Jail. Ten offenders were considered at full-sobriety status for 851 total CAM days monitored. This is a 98.8% Daily Sobriety Compliance Rate. The 2024 national average was 99%. 21 GPS participants accounted for a total of 1,461 days of electronic monitoring time.

SPECIALIZED DOCKETS

The MERIT Court was recertified by the Supreme Court of Ohio for a 3-year Certification. Over the course of 2024, there were 27 participants in the MERIT Court Drug Court Program. We had eight completions and two terminations. There were 33 assessments for the MERIT Court Program. There was only one participant who reoffended while in the program.

In 2024, the Mental Health Docket was certified by the Supreme Court. There were six initial participants with one who returned to residential treatment and was neutrally removed from the program. There was one participant removed for lack of participation and returned to standard supervision. There have been 15 individuals screened for the Mental Health Court Docket program.

GRANT RESOURCES

The Department was awarded two separate \$35,000 grants from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services for each of the specialized docket programs. Funds partially compensate Court expenses, including treatment services. The received funds are utilized for FY 25-26. This is the first year the grant has been rewarded for the Mental Health Court Docket and the fifth consecutive year for the Merit Court Program.

In 2024, the Department continued to utilize funds from the Ohio Department of Community Corrections CCA grant that awarded \$501,480.00 for FY 23-25. The CCA Grant pays for two full-time probation officers. The grant subsidizes the cost for a

substance abuse counselor who provides assessments for inmates at the Knox County Jail. A portion of the grant also supports many of the costs associated with transportation needs, educational and rehabilitative engagement groups, such as the Hands Down domestic violence series, Relapse Prevention, Thinking for a Change, Trauma, and the automated random call-in and urinalysis testing system. The Probation Department will apply for renewal in July 2025.

The Probation Department applied for the Ohio Attorney General Office Law Enforcement Program and was awarded \$5,400 to assist with the replacement costs of protective vests. The average cost is approximately \$1,500 per officer every five years.

OFFICER TRAINING

Officers completed a variety of continuing education through the ODRC, the Ohio Supreme Court Judicial College, Line Officer Training, and the National Association of Social Workers. MERIT Court and department officers and support staff attended the 2024 National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP) Conference. The cost to attend was grant-funded.

All Officers completed annual qualifications to carry a firearm and Taser. They participated in annual Tactical Decision Making, De-Escalation, and Use of Force training facilitated by the Mount Vernon Police Department (MVPD). The training simulates the need for lethal and non-lethal use of force through multiple scenarios to enhance various combinations of unarmed self-defense, Taser, firearm retention, and offender apprehension techniques.


Type of Order: 171 responses



Municipal offenders associated with the sentencing types above, with jail days set by the Probation Department, accounted for 1,532 of the total jail days served at the Knox County Jail. *The average Municipal offender stay was 4.2 days. Municipal offenders accounted for approximately 61% of all book-ins and 41% of total days served.

Alternative sentencing is afforded to offenders sentenced for certain non-violent offenses, such as OVI, and/or if standard incarceration prohibits adequate care of a documented medical condition.

In 2024, only 0.6% of municipal offenders served their sentence at the Richland Co Alternatives Center. Fourteen individuals were sentenced directly to inpatient programming for jail credit upon successful completion of the recommended services. Programs included the Phoenix Center, Cedar Ridge and Mended Reeds.

The Mount Vernon Municipal Court was created by the Ohio General Assembly, pursuant to Section 1901.01, Ohio Revised Code. The Court hears cases throughout Knox County and has the authority to hear the following cases:

- Felony Cases—initial appearance/preliminary hearings
- Misdemeanor Cases—through final determination
- Civil Actions-up to \$15,000.00
- Forcible Entry & Detainer (Evictions)
- Small Claims Actions—up to \$6,000.00
- Administrative Appeals–BMV case appeals

The Judge conducts hearings and finds probable cause to issue search warrants, pursuant to Rule 41 of the Ohio Rules of Criminal Procedure. During regular business hours, these hearings are conducted in Court. After regular business hours, the hearings are conducted electronically. In 2024, the Judge conducted 34 search warrant hearings.


There were 83 applications filed to seal the record of criminal cases. 6 marriages were performed in 2024.

EXPENSE REPORT 2024 - SALARIES

The Judge's salary is set according to R.C. 141.04 and 1901.11; the Clerk's by R.C. 1901.31; the Bailiff by R.C. 1901.32; the Deputy Clerks' by the Clerk; the Probation Officers' and Probation Clerk by the Judge and City Council; and Security Officers' by the Judge.
